What Does a Spirit-Formed Church Look Like?

A Spirit-formed church is a body of Spirit-formed people living in community. It is made alive by the Spirit and formed by the life of the Spirit into the image of Christ. The Spirit forms the church in various ways that are fully integrated and work in concert.

For our purposes, the Spirit's work in forming the church can be classified into four categories: identification, sanctification, empowerment by the Holy Spirit, and teaching by the Holy Spirit. Let's consider each of these in order.

By **identification**, we mean that believers are born again by the Spirit and baptized by the Spirit into Christ's body. The Spirit seals them and unites them as one. This identifying work of the Spirit gives life to the church, gives her members genuine spiritual unity with one another, and assures them of final redemption after death.

By sanctification, we mean the ongoing process of conveying the holiness of Christ into the lives of believers so that they are empowered to overcome sin and walk in true righteousness. Thus the Spirit-formed church is growing in righteousness, being transformed into the moral character of Christ.

By **empowerment**, we mean the supernatural strength and gifts of the Spirit that allow the Spirit-formed church to serve and thereby edify one another and to bear conclusive witness of the loving power of God to the world. In the Spirit-formed church, all the gifts of the Spirit function in harmony and order to the glory of God at the Spirit's discretion.

When we speak of the Spirit **teaching**, we think of His ability to convict, to lead into truth, to call to remembrance Jesus' teaching, and to enable meaningful communication with God. The Spirit-formed church has the eyes of her understanding enlightened by the revelation of God so that she grows in wisdom.

Clearly these various aspects of the Spirit's activity are designed to work in concert. The same Spirit that convicts believers *continued on page 3*

event, packed with excellent information. Karen is passionate about her subject matter and about her vision to carry God's Word to the next generation in a meaningful way.

The agenda for this "How to Revitalize Your Sabbath School" training was divided into four sections: 1) The Need for Teacher Training; 2) Doing the Heart Work and the Hard Work; 3) Teaching Activities and Ways to Promote Sabbath School; and 4) Teacher's Meetings. The training is highly recommended for all teachers, pastors, and Sabbath school superintendents.

Each student received the *Initial Teacher Training Manual for Sabbath School Teachers*, authored by Karen Edwards and published by Bible Advocate Press (in English and Spanish). Karen also recommends that students use Gospel Light's *Teacher Training Smart Pages*, made available at the seminar. Both these valuable tools are full of useful and easy-to-use information for our churches.


As a long-time schoolteacher, Karen freely shares her hard-learned concepts, tips, and ideas for not only teaching but also instilling the love of learning in students that will make them want to rush to Sabbath school each week.

Even former teachers who felt burned out were revitalized by this inspirational training. Three other training sessions are scheduled for the West Coast District: Phoenix, Arizona (December 19); Marion, Oregon (March 6, 2011); Southern California (to be announced). Teachers are admonished to attend this valuable classroom opportunity when it comes to your area.

This piece by John Stackhouse in his book Making the Best of It caught my attention in *Leadership Journal* (Summer 2010):

In a wide-ranging study of a number of major American denominations, the Search Institute of Minneapolis determined that the most important factor in producing a mature, well-balanced, and well-integrated Christian faith was not excellent preaching, worship, small-group fellowship, or anything else but adult Christian education. And yet I daresay there is no element in contemporary church life that is more poorly undertaken in most churches. A sermon and home Bible study each week cannot possibly suffice (p. 315).

Reading this, I was gratified to note the Teacher Training event conducted at the Lodi, California, church in late September. It was a district-sponsored event, featuring Karen Edwards of Spokane, Washington, as principal presenter. I am told it was well attended and very resourceful. This training will be conducted at other locations throughout the West Coast District, and beyond.

If Christian education is the single most important factor in producing mature believers, then the work of the Conference's Christian Education Committee is well worth our attention, support (prayers and finances) and applause. This small band of ladies (Gina Tolbert, Daisna Gibson, and Janice Orr), along with contributing writers who include Dorothy Nimchuk, Jeddie Larry, and Shirley Lindsey, under the direction of G. C. Curriculum Editor LeRoy Dais, have been at their task for quite a while. Working from a distance and being volunteers with many other responsibilities have presented a challenge, but their passion to produce Bible-based curriculum for children keeps them going. The first installment for intermediates was recently released and is finding positive reception in the field.

Stackhouse's observation, that this all-important element is perhaps the most poorly handled aspect of church life, is sobering. And it fortifies my response to those who've asked why the Conference is investing time and money in developing children's curriculum. No need to reinvent the wheel; just use materials already out there, they imply. My answer: If any aspect of the life of the Church deserves our most ardent attention and investment of resources, it is our children.

This has implications beyond children's curriculum: Bible study for adults, teens, training ministers (LifeSpring), and even the value of Spring Vale Academy.

So thanks for your support of this effort. Thanks to those who give to the Issachar Forum through which this is funded. And praise the Lord for the progress being made in this vital aspect of the life of the Church.

regarding the true nature of righteousness also empowers them to live in righteousness. Often this convicting ministry of the Spirit is carried out through a believer through whom a spiritual gift is manifest. This ministry edifies the believer and affirms to him his sure salvation as one sealed by the Spirit. Thus the Spirit's various activities work together. If any is missing, the Spirit's work is incomplete.

The church that does not experience the work of the Spirit in one or more of these areas is likely quenching, grieving, or resisting the Spirit in some way. Therefore the Spiritformed church is committed to submitting to and cooperating with the entire work of the Spirit. The church recognizes the Spirit as her *paraklete*, receives Him as the promised gift and Helper that He is, and honors Him as God's Spirit within her. The church listens to His teaching, responds to His conviction, manifests His power, and walks in His holiness.

Lodi Comes Alive

The Church of God (Seventh Day) has a long and rich history in Lodi, California, springing from two major roots: Lodi Seventh Day Church of God and Lodi Church of God (Seventh Day).

Lodi Seventh Day Church of God was established in 1908, with Elder Henry Baumbach serving as pastor. The church met in the homes of its members until 1912, when a building was purchased. Pastors who most recently served this congregation include Elders Glen Palmer, Larry Childers, Claude Ellis, and Melvin Reuscher.

Lodi Church of God (Seventh Day) was organized in 1938; Elder E. A. Straub served as pastor. A building was constructed in 1939-40 that served as home for almost 50 years. Beginning in 1941, a large tent was pitched in the parking lot for annual campmeetings. During these meetings, services were conducted in the tent, and the church building served as kitchen, dining hall, and dormitory. Pastors who most recently served the Lodi CoG7 include Elders Wesley Walker, Fred Walter, Nathan Lawson, Ray Straub, Kenneth Lawson, Michael Vlad, Loren Stacy, and Melvin Reuscher (co-pastor with Loren Stacy for several years). Chris Henderson and Sean Stacy have served as youth pastors and Scott Fischer as associate pastor.

June 18, 1988, these two congregations became one as they met together for Sabbath worship in a rented facility large enough to hold the united church; Elders Melvin Reuscher and Loren Stacy served as co-pastors. March 2, 2002, after almost 14 years of meeting in rented churches, raising funds, and building its own new facility, the CoG7 of Lodi was finally home. A formal Dedication Sabbath was enjoyed on April 27, 2002. Many former pastors, as well as members of other area CoG7 congregations, attended. Church of God (Seventh Day) in Lodi continues to prosper as God blesses. In addition to ongoing ministries to its members, it is part of a community-churches ministry to the poor and homeless. Currently the Lodi church is planning to offer afterschool tutoring for neighborhood children and expand its ministries through the Internet. Members are learning new ways to share the gospel and pray that God's kingdom will be increased as Christ lives in and through them.

NAMC Recharged at Gler

The ²⁰¹⁰ session of the North American Ministerial Council (the General Conference's ministerial arm) convened at the Glen Eyrie Conference Center, Colorado Springs, Colorado, October 18-23, under the theme "Recharging the Church With Grace and Truth."

Licensed and credentialed ministers were joined by lay pastors. With an unusually high number of wives, attendance peaked at approximately 170. The natural beauty of the Glen Eyrie campus and a well-planned program, coupled with the spirit of love and unity exhibited by attendees, made a busy week of Council business seem less arduous. Each day began with Corum Deo, a small group prayer and worship time, followed by breakfast in the castle dining hall and then business session in the Great Hall.

Each evening ended with worship and the spoken Word, given by members of the Council: Jhabel Chagollan, Jeff Endecott, and Ruben Marquez. These services were marked by heartfelt worship. Thursday ended with a Westernstyle dinner and entertainment at the Flying W Ranch, compliments of the General Conference, marking Pastor Appreciation Month.

Council business included a report of the License and Credentials Committee; discussion of the Church's attitude toward brethren who celebrate the Feast Days; reports from New Covenant Study Committee, Doctrinal Book Writing Committee, and LifeSpring

School of Ministry; the election of Council officers and members of the License and Credentials Committee; amendments of the Council bylaws and standing rules; amendments clarifying the Statement of Faith, Articles 3 and 6; and an amendment to the Ministerial Documentation Manual regarding requirements for the lay pastor's certificate. The Council heard a report and challenge from Whaid Rose regarding the Conference vision, particularly as it relates to the future development of the professional ministry, and nine hours of training in church revitalization was conducted by Dr. Tom Cheyney, North American Missions Board, Southern Baptist Convention.

How About Good?

After the few months I've been in the General Conference office, I can say without hesitation that we have a good operation going here. We have dedicated and efficient staff with a passion for Jesus and the upbuilding of His kingdom. We have a broad spectrum of ministries and services that further the mission of the denomination. We have excellent leadership in our president, Whaid Rose. We're doing amazingly well, given the resources we have to work with. God is definitely multiplying the few loaves and fishes.

As I survey our current operations and priorities from a newcomer's perspective, however, I have mixed feelings. We *are* doing *good*, but being "good" in the twenty-first century really means "also ran." It means that you didn't win in the race; you didn't even place. It means that your efforts ended up being irrelevant.

In many ways, "good" is worse than "bad" because people can be very satisfied with good and thereby ignore the profound dangers of being *merely* good. While they think, "We're doing fine . . . not great, but just fine," they necessarily ignore the youth leaving the church in droves, the aging ministers, the creeping compromises, the slowly failing infrastructure, the complacency, and the cross-less religion that are all hallmarks of a blinded "goodness" that has given up the idea of *great*!

So, what is doing *great* in the twenty-first century? Well, the so-

called "new atheism" is doing great. Wicca (white magic, otherwise known as witchcraft) is doing great. The "New Age" is doing great. All are growing by leaps and bounds!

In reaction to these forces, ecumenicism is the new "good" in Christianity, as even Christians lay down their crosses and adopt an antinomian, social-gospel, theistic-evolutionary, virtually universalist religion that they hope will remain relevant and appealing to the masses. By compromising with the world on topics ranging from homosexuality to the claims of science, mainstream Christianity attempts to avoid being relegated to that status of *quaint* and *backward* in the "marketplace of ideas."

Yet, despite Christianity's "best" efforts, in the developed world the ground occupied by Christianity is steadily and rapidly shrinking. The United States and Canada are quickly going the way of Europe, where all flavors of Christianity combined now form only a tiny minority. Is the Church of God (Seventh Day) doing better?

Our membership and leaders are aging, and we are not replacing them. Our youth are outright leaving, and even the ones who stay have deep and unanswered questions that tug at them. We are so fraught with an independent spirit that even talk of a "denomination" causes ire in many. We make some progress in the third world, but at home our membership dwindles and ages. We are not "winning," and we are not "placing"; we are losing. The Great Commission is a distant abstraction to many of us. Such is the nature of "good" in the



twenty-first century. The question is pressing: Can the gospel preached by the Church of God (Seventh Day) compete in the modern marketplace of ideas?

It will not do to respond by saying/praying, "Lord, come quickly." He responds, "Satisfy the Great Commission. Teach the peoples of the *world* the *truth*!" And if we can respond to such a challenge by thinking or, God forbid, saying out loud, "The Lord will return at the appointed time, so whatever we do or don't do toward the Great Commission is irrelevant," then we are indeed a Laodicean church that had better worry about being spewed out of His mouth! We exist in a marketplace of ideas, and we must do much better than "good" in order to win.

The Lord has appointed us a job, and it is indeed our privilege to do it. He could raise up stones in our place, but He honors us with participating in His saving work. Will we be satisfied with doing "good" in that work, or will we strive for *greatness* in that work?

What, exactly, does greatness mean? What does greatness take? President Rose and I will say much more about those questions in upcoming issues of *Churchright*. But I can start now by saying that we have hired new staff as a first step toward greatness. These people have been strategically placed to address pressing needs as we seek greatness in our essential services to the Church.

We have hired two new information technologies (IT) staff: Rick Frye and Rocky Cardwell. They have already worked wonders in completely revamping our digital presence. The marketplace of ideas is largely electronic in the twenty-first century, and our previous investment there was woefully inadequate. Rick and Rocky are continually upgrading our appearance and involvement in the digital world.

As the complexity of administering our denomination has increased, Elder Rose has been increasingly pulled away from visioning, preaching, and writing just to manage the everyday details of our operations. Abe Endecott, executive assistant, and I, executive director, were hired to relieve much of this burden and thereby enable Elder Rose to be more effective in casting the vision for the future. I now manage the operations of the denomination, and both Elder Rose and I enjoy Abe's help with the operational details.

Becky Robinson is not a "new hire," as she has been with us in a front-desk capacity for almost two years, but she has taken on a number of new responsibilities keeping our membership records current and readily accessible. Many of you have enjoyed her pleasant voice on the phone and have worked with her to keep our contact information up-todate. Effective communication is one of my top priorities, so Becky's help with keeping our data current is extremely important.

All of these strategic hires are necessary conditions for greatness; they are first steps toward a broader vision. However, they are far from sufficient.
