

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#### Christ-Centered

The General Conference's vision of a vibrant twenty-first century Church of God (Seventh Day) begins with the phrase *Christ-centered*. Why? What does this mean? And how is Christ-centeredness reflected in the life and ministry of the church?

To be "central to" something is to be critically important, basic, the main thing, without which normal function is compromised. Times Square and Grand Central Station are central to New York City's vast transit system. The brain and spinal cord (nervous system) are central to the human body. And Christ is central to the church. This is what the Bible says:

Giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the kingdom of light. For he has rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son he loves, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins. He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. For by him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things were created by him and for him. He is before all things, and in him all things hold together. And he is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning and the firstborn from among the dead, so that in everything he might have the supremacy (Colossians 1:12-18, NIV).

This is as plain as it gets. In the organization of the kingdom, God has ordained that Jesus be the supreme head of the church. He not only holds all things in the universe together in Him but also has purchased the church with His own blood (Acts 20:28). Jesus is our life (John 3:36); apart from Him, we can do nothing (15:5).

Therefore the Church must be Christ-centered. It forfeits its claim as a Christian church if anything or anyone other than Jesus is at its center.

A Christ-centered church honors Jesus in all it does. Christ is the object of its preaching and teaching. Biblical worship, expressing God's attributes and character, focuses on Jesus because He is the revelation of God (Hebrews 1:3). Such a church understands that it cannot truly honor the Father without honoring the Son. Christ is the model of its discipleship and the daily supply of spiritual needs.

If Jesus is not in center place, nothing else is in its right place. That's why the true measure of a Christian church is whether it gives Jesus center place in all it is (identity) and does (ministry). This is our chief aim in CoG7, to the glory of God.

# Announcing... First Annual Pastor of the Year Award



The Pastor of the Year Award is another initiative sponsored by the Issachar Forum in its continuing efforts toward cultivating a culture of excellence. Each General Conference congregation will have the opportunity to nominate its pastor for the award, and the winner will be announced in October 2010, in conjunction with Clergy Appreciation Month. Each pastor may be nominated only once by the congregation as a whole, by a few church members, or by the local church board.

The grand prize winner will receive a one-week Sabbath Experience expense-paid vacation for two at a pre-determined location. Six runners-up — one from each of the remaining districts — will receive a night-out dinner for two at the restaurant of their choice — a \$75 value.

### Lizards, Legacies, Love

Sabbath, November 28, 2009, was a festive day of celebration and thanksgiving for the Newton, North Carolina, congregation. It dedicated its brand new edifice, with former pastor Whaid Rose on hand for the message and act of dedication.

The Newton congregation's history began in 1933, when William Mason Coulter and wife, Lizzie (maternal great-grandparents to Elder Rose's wife, Marjolene), were introduced to the Sabbath. Barely literate, William couldn't verify this biblical truth for himself, so he asked the Lord for a sign: three lizards in the water on his next trip to the spring. Lizards weren't out this time of year, but the Lord gave that exact confirmation. The Coulters gave some of their land and other material resources to erect a small building where they and others could worship and fellowship together on the Sabbath.

In 1944 their son, Edward, and wife, Jetty, donated the property

on McKay Farm Road, where the church is currently located. A brick structure was erected, and the church was named Church of God of Little Coulters. It affiliated with the General Conference in 1978 through the influence of Calvin and Vertie (Coulter) Ijames, who spearheaded efforts to purchase an adjoining property now used as the fellowship building. (Calvin grew up in another Sabbathkeeping organization headquartered in North Carolina.) Melvin Sweet served as pastor of the Coulters church from 1981 to 1984 and Whaid Rose from 1990 to 1994. It has been served by Jonathan Ijames, lay pastor, since that time. Several name changes occurred throughout the years; the current name is Newton Community Church of God (Seventh Day).

The legacy of faithfulness and sacrifice by the Coulters continues through the dedication of many individuals and families the Lord has added to the congregation throughout the years. Current family names are Burke, Camero (Robinsons), Coulters, Edwards, Fox, Hunt, Hunter, Ijames, Kings (Rincker), Lawson, Littlejohn, Moodie, Rice, Richardson, Siffrod, Turner, and more. When these families were asked what attracted them to the Newton church, the predominant response was love, warm welcome, and a sense of belonging.

Can a church thrive and build new facilities with no more than a bivocational lay pastor? This congregation is proof that it can. In fact, under the humble, enthusiastic leadership of its lay pastor and local board, the Newton congregation has successfully completed its \$300,000 building project. Ministry to the elderly in rest homes and feeding the homeless are some of the ways this church reaches beyond its walls.

Praise God for the ministry of the Newton church. May it always be a point of light in its community and beyond.

## What Does the General Conference Do for Us?

#### For all of us, it

- Provides a corporate identity for the Church of God (Seventh Day).
- Provides unified purpose and leadership for the Church.
- Supplies finances and means by which the Church in North America participates with the Church around the world through the International Ministerial Congress.
- Supports the biennial meeting of the Church's General Conference convention by site selection, program planning, and publication of essential materials. The General Conference in session conducts

- the Church's business, including the election of its board of directors.
- Funds the work of any committee that may be called for by the general Church in session.

#### For ministers and pastors, it

- Provides funding for site selection and program of the biennial North American Ministerial Council meeting.
- Funds the Forum and ministerial directory, as well as the committees of the council, including the License and Credentials Commit-

- tee. Ministerial documentation is issued on behalf of the council by this committee.
- Administers and absorbs all overhead costs of the medical reimbursement, insurance, and retirement programs for Church employees.
- Provides all the ministerial letters, books, and other materials distributed from the president's office.

#### For local congregations and members, it

- Publishes Church news through *Churchright*.
- Provides financial support and facilitation to agencies of the G. C. Ministries, which in turn provide programs that assist local churches in ministry.
- Provides, upon request and upon approval of the district coordinator, regional membership lists and Bible Advocate subscription lists.
- Provides for the time and travel of the president and other personnel for speaking appointments on special occasions for local churches throughout North America.

#### For agencies and districts, it

- Provides office space and supplies for Publications (Bible Advocate Press) and LifeSpring School of Ministry.
- Provides, without charge, regional membership and Bible Advocate subscription lists and mailing labels upon request.
- Provides full accounting services for G. C. Ministries.
- Provides subsidy, when funds are available and when considered necessary, to other Church entities.
- Provides, on loan, translation equipment for retreats, Bible conferences, and leadership meetings.

# Times change, but do our churches? The

Summer 2009 *Leadership Journal* really caught my attention. The cover reads "iGens: How churches are integrating an isolated generation." Reared on television, cell phones, and iPods, this generation needs to hear the gospel in ways that break through the sounds and penetrate the images.

Every generation, in fact, needs to hear the gospel in ways it understands, based on the culture it was raised in. For example, *Journal* editor Marshall Shelley probes, "Who is the first U.S. president you remember from childhood?" Our answers are one of the following: Franklin Roosevelt, the Depression, and World War II; Kennedy, Vietnam, television, and Civil Rights; Bush/Clinton, the Internet, mobile technologies, and 9/11.

It gets even more complicated. Beyond the generations are people groups that significantly influence American life and culture. Christian researcher George Barna identifies them in his book *The Seven Faith Tribes*. His list may surprise you, and his tips on how to reach them are worth considering.

Of course, not all strategies to reach people groups have turned out as expected. In his *Journal* article "The X Factor," Collin Hansen says that most of the experimental worship services launched in the 90's to reach Gen-Xers have folded. In 2006 leaders of Willow Creek Church announced the end of Axis, its Saturday evening event with alternative music and relevant teaching for youth and young adults. This trend-setting ministry attracted thousands when first launched, but in time it had dwindled to fewer than 400.

Why is this so important? Because when the willows sway in South Barrington, Illinois, the evangelical world takes note. So many ministries are now reevaluating separate, age-targeted services. Apparently this approach has not helped the problem of age segregation within the church. Integration, not separation, is now the goal. Emerging generations are craving solid biblical preaching and the truths of sanctification and the holiness of God. They are returning to the rich hymnology that more clearly portrays God's sovereignty and providence, His love and justice.

The Village, a Dallas congregation, is a good example. In 2002 this primarily Boomer church of about 150 hired 27-year-old Matt Chandler as pastor and asked him to "bring a new perspective." A college pastor with a firm commitment to Calvinist theology, Chandler brought a new perspective to The Village. Rather than lowering

expectations and preaching highly practical sermons, he focused on doctrine, God's character, and an unashamed call to commitment and holy living. Today The Village is a multiple-site church with over 6,000 attending, and the majority of its members are under age 35.



Leadership Journal. Worthy of mention is "Open Source Activists," by J. R. Kerr, calling attention to the desire of the present generation to help create the church's vision, not just implement it — the surprising impact when leaders release control and empower a generation of influencers. This gets me thinking about the process of vision-casting in our own church and the need to empower the generations through involving them in the vision process. I will have more to say on this in future

Overall, churches tend to resist change, in part because they're out of touch with changes and developments in the world around them. That's why "Culture Watch" will be featured in *Churchright* in 2010. May we be in tune with the culture's current thoughts and trends so we can know how to minister to it.


