Evangelical?

Many find the word *evangelical* troublesome because of the baggage it carries. In fact, some mainline evangelicals are now shunning this label. So why is it part of our Conference's vision statement? If I am an evangelical, what am I?

Evangelical is rooted in the Greek *euangelion*, from which such terms as *gospel* and *good news* are derived. This word symbolized a movement at the turn of the twentieth century that attempted to bring balance to the fundamentalist movement. During that time orthodox Christianity was threatened by harmful elements on the rise: Higher Criticism (of Scripture), Darwinism, Liberalism, etc. In response, Christians emphasized and defended the "fundamentals" of faith.

Though noble in its intent, fundamentalism missed the mark, as summarized by Harold Ockenga in the *Evangelical Dictionary of Theology*: 1) Wrong attitude: suspicion of all those who don't adhere to every doctrine and practice they do; 2) Wrong strategy: separation aimed at having a totally pure church; and 3) Wrong results: failure to turn the tide of liberalism because it was so busy being right, it failed to address the cultural and social needs of people (p. 408).

To bring balance, evangelicalism emphasized the good news of the gospel and the centrality of Christ. It also stressed the need to embrace those committed to the gospel, cooperating with them in kingdom work despite doctrinal differences. This is why the Conference's vision statement includes *evangelical*. To be an evangelical is to be committed to Christ's gospel and to relationships with others outside our circle who are equally committed to the gospel.

This is not "easy believism" nor acceptance of all who wear a Jesus label. Some differences do matter, and not all who call themselves Christians truly *are*. But Scripture admonishes us more to be different from the world than to be different from other Christians. Scripture also teaches that those who love Christ and embrace His gospel are not enemies of the faith.

Historically the Church of God (Seventh Day) has looked more like fundamentalism (as described by Ockenga) than evangelicalism. Thus I hope you can understand and appreciate the inclusion of this term in the Church's vision statement.

However, I must confess that while its overarching principles remain important, the term *evangelical* itself has less and less appeal. Though noble in its intent, evangelicalism has fallen into the same predicament fundamentalism fell into in the mid-twentieth century: imbal-



ance. Out of balance, fundamentalism becomes rigid and exclusive; evangelicalism becomes fluffy and all-inclusive. A biblically balanced church will be committed both to the fundamentals of the faith and to the gospel of Christ. In fact, such a church views Christ's gospel as the foremost fundamental.

Therefore what we really mean to say by *evangelical* is that we are "distinct, but not exclusive" and that being "in Christ," rather than "being different," should be the basis of our identity as Christians. I have suggested to the board of directors that the word *evangelical* be substituted with the phrase *distinct, but not exclusive* in our vision statement. Watch our various publications for the updated statement. And meanwhile, catch the vision!

Doing Church in Cut and Shoot

In 1930 one Brother R. C. Ward began visiting scattered brethren in an area of Texas known as Cut and Shoot, part of Conroe and an hour north of Houston. They met in homes for Sabbath school, but with the assistance of the Walton and Mc-Coy families, Brother Ward began holding meetings in the school building. Thus a new congregation was planted, and the original building was constructed in 1932.

Brother Ward was called to California, and the congregation went without a pastor for many years. After its sale to the Three Rivers congregation (also being formed at the time), the building was eventually dismantled and moved by wagon to that area.

Eighty years and a number of pastors later, the Conroe, Texas, congregation continues to be a "point of light" in its community — and beyond. Not everything can be said about this local church in the space available, but its education emphasis is worthy of note. A few years ago the church added a state-of-the-art education wing to its facilities, which includes a playground and basketball court. Local church board chairman Dennis O'Banion says that this new addition is a place where people can fellowship after the morning services, where children, youth, and young adults can be taught from God's Word. Overall, the church wants the education building to be a place where young people can have fun. It's a great outreach tool as well, attracting many VBS students from the community.

The Conroe congregation has a reputation for providing large financial support to various entities of the Church of God, including Spring Vale Academy. It sponsors SVA students from the Conroe church and from other parts of the country. Additional assistance is provided to

District boards and finance committees, the SVA board, G. C. administration, and board of directors — these are among the places where leaders from the Conroe con-

gregation have served over the years. The church is also responsible for *Afterglow*, a publication for CoG7 senior adults. The Conroe Youth Conference, hosted annually for the past several years, draws hundreds of young people.

Thank God for Conroe's members, past and present; for its pastors, including its most recent, Nathan Lawson (who served for 25 years); and for Alex Ciurana, who will soon begin his tenure there as pastor. Conroe has been not only a good team player within the General Conference but also a beacon of light in its community. May it continue, till Jesus returns.

This page is dedicated to the memory of three servants of the Church. Two were documented ministers (John Martinez and Wesley Coulson) and the other, a layman — Albert Fischer, aptly described as "an outstanding churchman." May their memory live long among us.

John Martinez

John Martinez (60), pastor of the Oklahoma City CoG7, passed away October 12, 2009. Funeral services were held October 16, 2009, at the church he served for ten years.

John was born August 24, 1949, in Valla Hermosa Taps, Mexico, to Juan M. and Gonzala (Gonzales) Martinez. He was drafted in the Army during the



Vietnam War and proudly served his country for 13 years. John enjoyed hunting, fishing, and spending time with his family. He is survived by his loving wife of 39 years, Petra, four children, and 12 grandchildren.

Brother Coulson was born in Kent County, Michigan, on December 20, 1935. He was the son of Homer and Anna (Timmerman) Coulson and a graduate of



Spring Vale. He also attended Midwest Bible College.

Brother Coulson pastored the CoG7 in Saskatchewan, as well as other churches in the United States and Canada. He retired from Spring Vale in 2002, having completed 18 years of service.

He is survived by four children and two grandchildren. His wife, Carol, preceded him in death.

Albert Fischer

Albert Fischer, former CoG7 district coordinator, died December 28, 2009. He was 90.

Born October 29, 1919, in Eureka, South Dakota, Albert worked in various lines of work and at one time owned and operated his own straw and hay business, sod business, a service station, and a house-moving business.



In 1943 Albert married Hulda Kiesz, and they joined the Church of God (Seventh Day) in 1953. Except for

Ten years of mission training and another great PMT trip! Thanks to Minister Isaac Santiago Jimenez (overseer for Mexican District 6), Dr. Erick de la Garza, their team of leaders, and the members in Guadalajara for a superb job!

Most of our 19 members arrived in Guadalajara, Jalisco, México on December 21, 2009. A large team from local CoG7 congregations met us.

The team from the U.S. represented Idaho, Oregon, California, Nevada, Oklahoma, Washington, North Carolina, and Minnesota. The entire group of leaders, cooks, worship bands, including those from the U.S., numbered nearly 60. The team included several student missionaries from the state of Aguascalientes, also part of District 6 of the Iglesia de Dios (Séptimo Día).

After a time of worship, we underwent training for a few hours by one of the many ministers and some lay people.

Following lunch break, we put our classroom training to work through activities like an orphanage visit, clown and mime acts in a convalescent home for the elderly, and a service dinner with a local chapter of Alcoholics Anonymous. In the plaza our team reached out to a large crowd already gathered. They distributed gifts, Bibles, and questionnaires and presented a skit.

The team also visited a local hospital to visit, provide food, and pray for patients. It was beautiful to see how we impacted so many people for Christ in such a short time.

One activity that was especially a blessing to us was the *brigade* ("brigade"), which is a team of people providing services such as free haircuts, clothes distribution, medical consultations, and the like to the public in a very poor neighborhood.
