Changing Course

An important announcement

It was a foggy night on the Atlantic. Seeing a light in the distance, the captain of a US Naval ship radioed the following message: "Divert your course 15 degrees to the north to avoid collision."

A voice came back with this reply: "I recommend *you* divert *your* course 15 degrees to the south to avoid collision."

With greater insistence, the captain repeated, "This is the captain of a US Navy ship. I say again, divert *your* course."

But the response was no less insistent: "No, I say again, you divert *your* course."

Resorting to size and fighting capacity, the captain declared, "This is the aircraft carrier *USS Abraham Lincoln*, the second largest ship in the United States Atlantic fleet. We are accompanied by two destroyers, three cruisers, and numerous support vessels. I demand that you change your course 15 degrees north. That's one-five degrees north, or counter measures will be undertaken to ensure the safety of this ship."

The exchange then ended when the plain-speaking voice replied simply, "This is the lighthouse. It's your call."

Various versions of this story exist, and the US Navy denies its veracity. But whether it is a true account or an urban legend, its popularity may be attributed to the valuable life lessons it teaches. They include the danger of self-importance and the reality that changing course is more often about "us" than about "them."

These principles informed David's thoughts as he prayed, "Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts: And see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting" (Psalm 139:23, 24, KJV). And I trust they were the guiding influence in my decision to "change course" regarding my role as Conference president.

During the February meeting of the board of directors, I asked that my replacement be selected. Because it isn't likely this will happen by the time of the upcoming convention, it was mutually agreed that I would continue to serve through the 2015 convention, giving ample time to pray and process this critical decision. I shared this with directors and superinten-

Under the current "Unity" theme, ministries directors and district superintendents gathered in Omaha April 21-23 for the annual leadership meeting. Major emphases included gaining advantage by fostering organizational clarity, rebuilding spiritual walls Nehemiah style, and making endings and transitions normal parts of our corporate culture.

Whaid Rose, Conference president, and Rick Frye, director of operations, led the group in a SWOT analysis of the General Conference (SWOT stands for strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats). Matching weaknesses with strengths and opportunities confirmed the results of a SWOT done earlier this year and presented to the board of directors. There was much excitement about plans for future church development resulting from the analysis.

A significant aspect of this meeting was Whaid Rose's announcement of his pending resignation (see front page). All ministries and districts were represented. Reports from directors and superintendents were encouraging.

Meeting in Omaha provided opportunity to acquaint key leaders with the convention facilities, which evoked much excitement. The meeting ended with leaders standing together, in our joint efforts and in heart and mind, affirming our unity in the Spirit.

SHINE Medical and Dental Missions team ministered in Haiti
March 25 – April 1. Whaid Rose
joined the team mid-week. The effort was largely a success, though
somewhat hindered by ten barrels of
medication that were not delivered
(and are still unaccounted for).

Long lines of people stretched across the open area of the compound long before the team arrived each morning. Haiti is the poorest nation in the Americas. These people live in poor circumstances — many in tent cities — and most have never received medical care of

this kind before. They're desperate, exploited, and in great need. And to the glory of God, over the four-day period the team served some 3,000 patients, providing comprehensive medical care and committing to follow up on a number of serious cases.

The goal of Mission Haiti was to disburse funds received in response to the 2010 disaster — approximately \$100,000. Half of that amount was expended through the recent effort, plus an additional \$15,000 disbursed in food distribution through local CoG7 pastors

and congregations and a donation to a ministry that conducts feeding programs for the elderly, women, and their children. The remaining funds will be used for long-term projects through Food for the Poor, a ministry in Haiti that specializes in building water treatment units and basic housing.

The need in Haiti is great; the work has only just begun. Your support of Missions has made this effort possible, and your continued interest and prayers will allow it to continue.
