Worship at Its Core — Whaid Guscott Rose

We derive from Scripture that the worship of God is the most important activity in which Christians can engage. The true measure of a church is its capacity to honor God with biblical worship. The church's life and ministry should flow out of its preoccupation with the worship of God. A day is coming when all of human history will narrow down to one thing: the ceaseless praise and adoration of the Lamb of glory. Therefore, as Christians, our most important question should be, How shall we worship?

That's where the problem of worship begins, Skye Jethani cautions — especially for Americans who place such high value on the pragmatic, the utilitarian, and the transactional. We care much about what works and what's most practical, and about negotiating deals. We transfer this approach to our worship of God, and our American version of the golden calf emerges! Its worshippers ask, "What new thing can we do to get to the next level?" They demand practical sermons, so worship is transactional; expect something in return for giving to God. As prime example, Jethani cites this tweet directed at God by an NFL player after losing a game: "I praise you 24/7 and this is what You do to me? You expect me to learn from this? How? I will never forget this! Ever!"

This tweet exposes the serious state of worship in our day. It becomes a means to an end. Jethani's assertion is timely: "God does not exist to be useful. He exists to be adored, simply because of who he is. True worship is never transactional."* At its core, true worship is giving God all we are and have, no matter how costly, expecting nothing in return. This principle has scriptural backing, including the story of the woman who poured an entire alabaster jar of very costly perfume on Jesus in selfless worship (see Mark 14:3, 4). Those looking on called it a waste; the woman considered it worship. Her extravagance reflected the depth of her love.

It is therefore reasonable to infer from this that most of us have never truly worshipped God — in a seemingly wasteful extravagance, with one desire: "to behold the beauty of the LORD" (Psalm 27:4, NKJV). This is worship's call. May our souls say, "Yes!"



The Heart of Worship

Not too long ago, two San Antonio congregations, Heart of Worship and Living Rock Church, merged to form a larger and stronger local church called New Hope United.

The following question was recently posed to its leadership:

"The name Heart of Worship is part of your local church's history. Is it safe to say that though worship is no longer part of its name, it remains an important part of the life and ministry of the congregation? Why? What is worship? What does worship mean to your local church?"

Response:

"A local church's name should reflect its mission. The use of the name Heart of Worship was to reflect our understanding that we were made for the purpose of worship and that it is therefore central to what it means to be a church. Worship isn't complicated. Worship is simply responding to God's love. We love Him because He first loved us (1 John 4:19). We give back to Him what He gave us in the first place. We do so not out of obligation, but as a natural inclination of the heart. This delights the Father just as earthly fathers delight in the spontaneous joyful love response of their children. This leads to deeper intimacy and the surrender of our gifts and abilities in service to the Lord.

"Though our church is no longer called Heart of Worship, this understanding of worship remains an integral part of who we are. The passion of ministry is getting back to the heart of worship."





Philippines Update

On November 8 the central islands of the Philippines took a devastating blow from super-typhoon Haiyan. You've seen images of the destroyed east shore city of Tacloban and other locations along the storm's path. The suffering there is incomprehensible.

CoG7 members in the Philippines are concentrated on the southern island of Mindinao and were mostly unaffected by this storm. We have fewer members and churches around the northern city of Manila, an area that also escaped the wrath of Haiyan. The brunt of this killer storm was borne in the country's midsection, the state of Visayas. Most or all of the relief funds we will send to the Philippines will go toward helping the people in that east-central area, including any members of our church (a dozen or more scattered congregations in Visayas) who may need it.

Hundreds of thousands of people, a majority of them Christians by profession, are now homeless, hungry, and facing the task of rebuilding with very few resources. From our Disaster Relief Fund, CoG7 joins the many who have sent or will send financial assistance. An amazing and encouraging sub-theme of this great tragedy is that our church's leaders in the Philippines report that as of late November, no members of our church have lost their lives and that property damage among CoG7 families is relatively minor. Let us thank God for this!

Recently CoG7 members in the US and Canada have responded generously to support our brethren in southern Mexico who experienced serious flooding in September. Now we ask you to open your hearts again — to the people of the Philippines in their time of need — by an offering earmarked "DRF" or "Disaster Relief." You can contribute either online (cog7.org) or in the local plate.

On behalf of hurting people who've been helped in dozens of places around the world through DRF, thanks to all of you!

Missions Travels

Thanks for tracking with us in your thoughts and prayers on our recent trip to five Far East and Down Under countries in 26 days.

- We flew more than 30,000 miles in 20 flight segments, about 70 hours in the air. Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia (three times), and Seoul, Korea (twice), were our most-visited airports. We also traveled by bus (eight hours to the Hatton area in Sri Lanka), by train (India), by taxi (Myanmar), by rickshaw (India), and by private car (Philippines, India, Australia) amid often chaotic traffic. In 26 nights away from home, we slept in ten different beds. We spent six nights flying and one in a train (sleeper).
- We visited about a dozen local churches and a dozen family homes. We taught at six pastor-leader conferences and dedicated two new church or school buildings, handing out BAP books and tracts freely along the way. We invested several hours with Church leaders in each country, reviewing the status of CoG7 in each place, offering counsel, and exploring ways G. C. Missions might encourage and assist. All the brethren sent their hearty

Spanish Assistant Dean

On November 4 Santiago Chavez joined the LifeSpring School of Ministry team as Spanish assistant dean of Academic Affairs. He is responsible for Spanish language academic programming, including curriculum development and faculty oversight. His appointment allows LifeSpring to live up to its commitment to serv-



ing the General Conference's growing Hispanic constituency, reflected in LifeSpring's student demographic.

Initial funding for this position was approved by the board of directors, based on the agreement that LifeSpring staff be responsible for raising long-term funding. May the whole Church rally behind this effort, with even greater support from those who directly benefit from this staff addition. Gifts earmarked "LifeSpring Spanish" will be directed to this need.

After serving faithfully in lay ministry at the Lanham, Maryland congregation for many years, Santiago recently planted the Open Arms Church of God (Seventh Day) in Gaithersburg, Maryland. He earned a Diploma of Pastoral Ministry from LifeSpring in 2011 and is continuing his education with a master of arts in Christian Counseling and Discipleship from Capital Bible Seminary.

Santiago Chavez has served as assistant director of G. C. Missions since April. Effective with his new assignment with LifeSpring, Brother Chavez no longer serves with G. C. Missions. In addition to his good qualifications for the LifeSpring position, the decision to switch departments was prayerfully made based on matching the most urgent ministry need with the area of greatest passion, and has the blessing of those involved in both departments.

Preschool/kindergarten. In God – Always in Control, Always with a Plan the lessons start with Noah and the Flood and end with Joseph saving his family from the famine.




